Project Title: Governing IV – Past and Future

Description: Students studied stressful economic and housing conditions among Isla Vista students and conducted a survey of those living in the community. The class (HIST-197IV) was led by Salvador Rangel, a sociology graduate student with quantitative skills. More than 250 lengthy interviews were conducted by students in the class, filling out an 18 page questionnaire. Key students then took that data and created a final report, “Isla Vista Students Under Stress,” which was published on the Center for the Study of Work, Labor, and Democracy website.
