Ukrainians know what "nuclear pollution", "ecological genocide", and "eco-memory" mean because of the Chornobyl accident, the great 1986 catastrophe near Kyiv, the Ukrainian capital. This cultural memory is embodied in Ukrainian children's literature covering different genres, such as short novels, novels, eco-comics, and picturebooks. This talk assumes that literature recalls human and nonhuman interactions through cultural memory and eco-memory. Analyzing Ukrainian children's literature on Chornobyl issues, it aims to show that this literature is nature-oriented within memory studies.
